GEORGE E. THIBAUT, MD

Dr. Thibault is president of the Josiah Macy Jr. Foundation and chairman of the Board of the Academy. Previously, he served as vice president of clinical affairs at Partners Healthcare System in Boston and director of the Academy at Harvard Medical School (HMS). For nearly four decades at HMS, Dr. Thibault played leadership roles in many aspects of undergraduate and graduate medical education. He was the first Daniel D. Federman Professor of Medicine and Medical Education at HMS and is now the Federman Professor, emeritus. He is a member of the U.S. National Academy of Medicine [formerly Institute of Medicine].



JUDITH A. SALERNO, MD, MS

Dr. Salerno is president of The New York Academy of Medicine. A physician executive and one of the nation's pre-eminent leaders in health and health care, Dr. Salerno most recently served as president and chief executive officer of Susan G. Komen™, the world's largest breast cancer organization. She also served as the Leonard D. Schaeffer Executive Officer of the IOM, deputy director of the National Institute on Aging at the NIH, and associate chief of staff at the VA Medical Center in Washington, D.C. Dr. Salerno is a board-certified physician in internal medicine and received an MD from Harvard Medical School and a Master of Science in Health Policy from the Harvard School of Public Health.



BARBARA A. GREEN, PhD

Dr. Green is the chair of the Academy's Committee on Admission and Membership. She is also senior vice president for the Greater New York Hospital Association's GNYHA Ventures, Inc., where she is responsible for new business development in areas that assist member institutions in improving operational efficiency, patient quality and access, workforce recruitment and retention, and regulatory compliance. During more than 20 years at GNYHA, Dr. Green has served in numerous policy and business-related positions, including director of public affairs and education, and executive director of the Greater New York Hospital Foundation, Inc. She has been an Academy Fellow since 1998.

CANDIDATES FOR THE BOARD OF TRUSTEES



SHERINE E. GABRIEL, MD, MSc

Dr. Gabriel is dean of Rutgers Robert Wood Johnson Medical School. Previously, she served as dean of Mayo Medical School at the Mayo Clinic. Her largely NIH-funded research has resulted in more than 250 peer-reviewed original scientific publications addressing the costs, determinants and outcomes of the rheumatic diseases. Dr. Gabriel is past president of the American College of Rheumatology and has served on many governmental committees and advisory boards, including the FDA Drug Safety and Risk Management Committee. She was appointed by the U.S. Government Accountability Office to the methodology committee of the Patient-Centered Outcomes Research Institute (PCORI), created by the Patient Protection and Affordable Care Act of 2010, and served as the committee's first chair. Dr. Gabriel received an MD from the University of Saskatchewan.



MARC D. GRODMAN, MD

Dr. Grodman is assistant professor of clinical medicine at Columbia University College of Physicians and Surgeons and assistant attending physician at NewYork-Presbyterian, New York City. He founded Bio-Reference Laboratories in 1981 and served as the chairman, chief executive officer and president until 2016. Dr. Grodman was elected as chairman of the Board of the American Clinical Laboratories Association in 2007. He is on the Executive Committee of the Health Care Leadership Council. From 1982 to 1984, he served as medical consultant to the Metal Trades Department of the AFL-CIO. He serves as the chairman of CareEvolve.com, Inc. and as a trustee of The Actors Fund. Dr. Grodman received an MD from Columbia University College of Physicians and Surgeons in 1977.



WILLIAM A. HASELTINE, PhD

Dr. Haseltine is chairman and president of ACCESS Health International, Inc., a foundation active in the United States, India, China, Singapore, Sweden and the Philippines. He is also chairman of Haseltine Foundation for Science and the Arts. He is well known for his pioneering work on cancer, HIV/AIDS and genomics. He is the founder of Human Genome Sciences, Inc. and served as the chairman and CEO of the company for twelve years. He was a professor at Harvard Medical School and Harvard School of Public Health from 1976-1993 where he was founder and chair of the Division of Biochemical Pharmacology and the Division of Human Retrovirology. Dr. Haseltine is the chairman of the US-China Health Summit, a lifetime governor of the New York Academy of Sciences, a trustee of the Brookings Institution, and a member of the Council on Foreign Relations, among many other appointments.



STANLEY A. LEFKOWITZ, PhD

Mr. Lefkowitz is chief financial officer and executive vice president of The Falconwood Corporation (formerly the Mocatta Group). He has been with The Falconwood Corporation since March 1975. The companies in The Falconwood Corporation have been in the merchant banking business and are currently functioning as a family office for a large net worth family. Over the years he has been responsible for the Office of the Chairman, Internal Audit; Administrative Services; the coordination of the International Executive Committee meetings; liaison to the Board of Directors; and trustee of the Pension Plan. He has served as the chairman of the Board of Visitors of the College of Science and Technology at Temple University and on Princeton University's Graduate School's Dean's Council. He serves as a director of OneTitle National Guaranty Company, Inc. Mr. Lefkowitz received a PhD in chemistry from Princeton University.

Dr. Riley is president of SUNY Downstate Medical Center. He also holds two faculty appointments: professor of internal medicine in the College of Medicine and professor of health policy and management in the School of Public Health. He previously served as the 10th president, chief executive officer, and professor of medicine at Meharry Medical College. Dr. Riley is an elected member of the prestigious National Academy of Medicine, where he serves as chair of the Administration of Health Services, Education and Research. An academic primary care general internist, Dr. Riley is immediate past president and president emeritus of the American College of Physicians. Dr. Riley received an MPH from the Tulane University School of Public Health and Tropical Medicine, an MBA from Rice University, and an MD from the Morehouse School of Medicine.



PAUL P. TANICO, JD

Mr. Tanico is the founder and managing principal at CastleRock Management and has 35 years of experience in the investment business, initially in research at David J. Greene & Co. and then as a portfolio manager at Atalanta Sosnoff, Neuberger Berman and Omega Advisors, where he was one of the original partners prior to founding CastleRock in 1993. Mr. Tanico received a BS in Finance and Accounting from New York University in 1977 and a JD from Fordham University School of Law in 1980, and is a member of the New York State Bar. 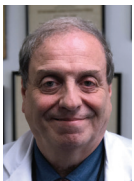

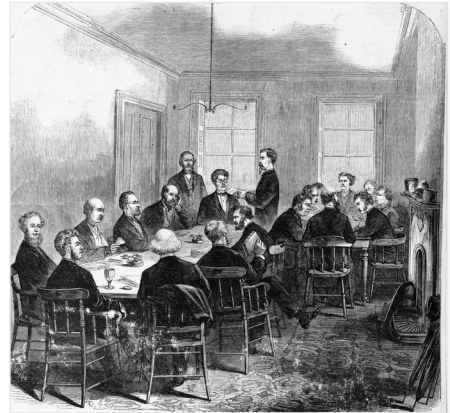

CELEBRATING 170 YEARS

A LEGACY OF HEALTH, HISTORY AND PROGRESS

Since its founding just before the start of the Civil War, the Academy has been a vital source for effective and, often, radical thought and action regarding the health care and public health problems that affect New York City, in particular, and cities in general.

In the 1840s, New York City faced turmoil in medicine and public health on many fronts. Traditional methods of medical practice were often more traumatic than the diseases themselves; avoidable infections were taking a powerful toll on lives in the best hospitals, and one in three women were dying in childbirth. Community health conditions were appalling, with 50 percent of children dying before the age of one.

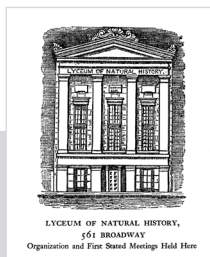


The Board of Health in session. Frank Leslie's Illustrated Newspaper, April 14, 1866, the Academy's Healy Collection.

On a Saturday afternoon in December 1846, a group of fourteen New York City-based physicians gathered to discuss spurring progress in medicine. By January 6, they had written the constitution for The New York Academy of Medicine.

Soon after that meeting, the founding Fellows made protecting the city's most vulnerable inhabitants a chief priority: managing the cholera outbreak of 1848, for example, or ensuring the purity of the milk supply in 1886. But they also had the vision to ensure that the ability to regulate the city's health would be legally codified. Only nine years after the Academy's founding, it started petitioning the state legislature for certain changes in health law, eventually lobbying for an act that, in 1886, created a

city health department—with at least four physicians on its board, by law—that could both make and enact legislation for its citizens' well-being. The department would go on to become a model for others nationwide.

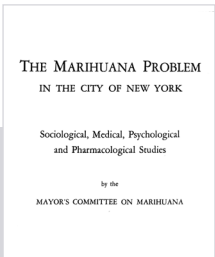

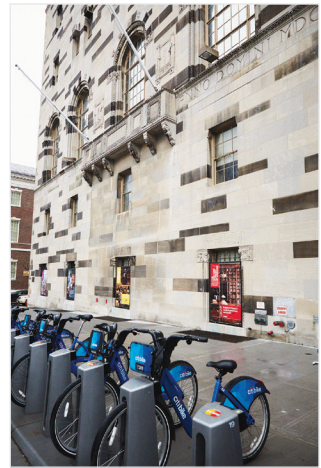

The Academy also used its compassionate brand of pragmatism and ability to use research to shape policy to introduce, early in the 20th century, the idea that addiction and other forms of substance use should be addressed as a public health issue, as opposed to solely a criminal justice concern. That open-minded approach continued in its early championing of needle exchange in the 1990s, and its recommendation, in 1969, of the establishment of methadone maintenance clinics for heroin users.

In its approach to drug policy, as with many other health issues, the Academy was often far ahead of its time, delivering findings that the public may not have been ready to hear: in 1944, the LaGuardia Report—a study of marijuana use in New York City—established findings that the drug was not, in fact, addictive or being used as a gateway to more addictive, crime-inducing drugs, evidence that was contrary to the policy aims of the mayor who commissioned the report.

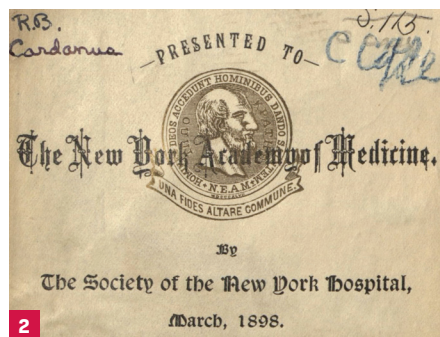
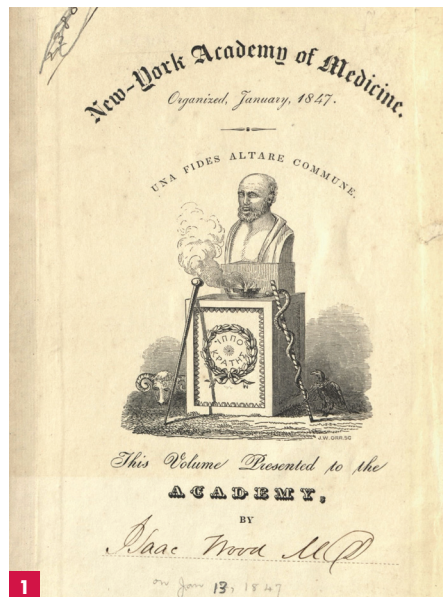

Rigorous research has always undergirded the Academy's policy proposals, whether in the arena of maternal health or sanitation. Willard Parker, one of the founders, was crucial to a door-to-door initiative that yielded a comprehensive survey of New York's sanitary conditions in 1865. The Academy was also one of the first organizations to study the impacts of the 9/11 terrorist attacks, turning its attention to not just physical effects—respiratory issues—but mental health concerns such as PTSD.

Today, the Academy's work is—in many ways—a continuation of what the organization did in its earliest days, serving as an even-handed convener to solve problems and using influence and reputation to make change and promote health.

DISCOURSE SPEAKER

DAVID OSHINSKY, PhD

David Oshinsky, PhD, was invited to present the 170th Anniversary Discourse for his distinguished contributions to examining the development of American medicine and health care through his monographs and essays, including the Pulitzer Prize-winning book *Polio: An American Story* (2005) and *Bellevue: Three Centuries of Medicine and Mayhem at America's Most Storied Hospital* (2016).

Dr. Oshinsky is a professor of history at NYU and directs the Division of Medical Humanities at NYU Langone Medical Center. A graduate of Cornell, with a doctorate in American History from Brandeis, he has taught at Rutgers and the University of Texas, and was voted "Liberal Arts Professor of the Year" at both institutions. Dr. Oshinsky's books include *A Conspiracy So Immense: The World of Joe McCarthy*, which was selected as a "Notable Book of the Year" by the *New York Times*; *Worse Than Slavery*, which was awarded the Robert F. Kennedy Book Prize for its distinguished contribution to human rights; *Polio: An American Story*, which won the Pulitzer Prize for History; and *Bellevue: Three Centuries of Medicine and Mayhem at America's Most Storied Hospital*, which was honored as the "best book about New York City" by the New York Library Society in 2016.

Dr. Oshinsky's other awards include the Cartwright Prize from the College of Physicians and Surgeons; the Hoover Presidential Book Award; the Scribes Award from the American Bar Association for excellence in legal writing; the Hardeman Prize from the LBJ Library for best book about the history of Congress; and the Dean's Medal from the Bloomberg-Johns Hopkins School of Public Health. He has also been a four-time juror for the Pulitzer Prizes in History and Biography.

NANCY E. ADLER, PhD

THE ACADEMY MEDAL FOR DISTINGUISHED CONTRIBUTIONS IN BIOMEDICAL SCIENCE

Nancy E. Adler, PhD, is being honored for her pioneering work in understanding health behaviors, particularly health-damaging behaviors, as well as her work on the impact of socioeconomic status on health and the role of psychosocial mediators.

Dr. Adler is the Lisa and John Pritzker Professor of Psychology in the Departments of Psychiatry and Pediatrics at the University of California, San Francisco (UCSF), vice-chair of the Department of Psychiatry, and director of the Center for Health and Community. Her early research examined the utility of decision models for understanding health behaviors with particular focus on reproductive health. Her subsequent work has addressed social and behavioral determinants of health. As director of the MacArthur Foundation Research Network on SES and Health, she coordinated research on social, psychological and biological mechanisms by which socioeconomic status (SES) gets “under the skin.”

Dr. Adler is a Fellow of the American Psychological Society, which awarded her the James McKeen Cattell Award, and of the American Psychological Association, which awarded her the Distinguished Scientific Award for the Application of Psychology. At UCSF, she has received the Chancellor’s Award for Advancement of Women, the George Sarlo Prize for Excellence in Teaching, the Lifetime Achievement in Mentoring Award, the Lloyd Holly Smith, and was selected as Faculty Research Lecturer. She is a member of the American Academy of Arts and Sciences and of the National Academy of Medicine (formerly Institute of Medicine) and is a National Associate of the National Academy of Science. Dr. Adler received a BA from Wellesley College and a PhD in Psychology from Harvard University.

DONALD M. BERWICK, MD, MPP, FRCP

THE ACADEMY MEDAL FOR DISTINGUISHED CONTRIBUTIONS IN HEALTH POLICY

Donald M. Berwick, MD, MPP, FRCP, is being honored for his seminal work in advancing the field of health care quality improvement as president of the Institute for Healthcare Improvement, and subsequently as administrator of the Centers for Medicare and Medicaid Services.

Dr. Berwick is president emeritus and a senior fellow at the Institute for Healthcare Improvement, an organization that he co-founded and led as president and CEO for 18 years. He is one of the nation's leading authorities on health care quality and improvement. In July 2010, President Obama appointed Dr. Berwick to the position of administrator of the Centers for Medicare and Medicaid Services, which he held until December 2011.

A pediatrician by background, Dr. Berwick has served as clinical professor of pediatrics and health care policy at Harvard Medical School and professor of health policy and management at the Harvard School of Public Health. He has also served as vice chair of the U.S. Preventive Services Task Force, the first "independent member" of the Board of Trustees of the American Hospital Association, and chair of the National Advisory Council of the Agency for Healthcare Research and Quality.

Dr. Berwick is an elected member of the National Academy of Medicine (formerly Institute of Medicine). His numerous awards include the 2012 Gustav O. Lienhard Award from the IOM and the 2013 Nathan Davis Award from the American Medical Association. In 2005, he was appointed "Honorary Knight Commander of the British Empire" by Queen Elizabeth II, the highest honor awarded by the UK to non-British subjects, in recognition of his work with the British National Health Service.

Paula A. Johnson, MD, MPH, is being honored for her public leadership and groundbreaking work in advancing women's health across the world through research, innovation, interdisciplinary education and advocacy.

Dr. Johnson is the 14th president of Wellesley College. She is a highly respected and passionate leader, deeply committed to women and to sustainably improving their lives. Dr. Johnson is recognized internationally as an innovator who has brought her broad range of experience as a researcher, educator, and expert in health care, public health, and health policy to bear in the effort to advance the well-being of women. With a remarkable track record of accomplishments—she founded the Connors Center for Women's Health and Gender Biology at Brigham and Women's Hospital—she has led in the field of women's health, taking an approach to biology that integrates insights from sociology, economics, and many other fields.

Dr. Johnson was the Grayce A. Young Family Professor in Women's Health at Harvard Medical School, as well as professor of epidemiology at the Harvard T.H. Chan School of Public Health. Her research, her vision, and her interdisciplinary approach to leading at the intersection of health care, education, and public health have placed her in key leadership roles in organizations around the world.

THE JOHN STEARNS MEDAL FOR DISTINGUISHED CONTRIBUTIONS IN CLINICAL PRACTICE

Herbert Pardes, MD, is being honored for his contributions to the field of psychiatry, including as director of the National Institute of Mental Health, as well as transforming care delivery overall as the president and CEO of NewYork–Presbyterian Hospital and NewYork–Presbyterian Healthcare System.

Dr. Pardes is executive vice chairman of the Board of Trustees of NewYork–Presbyterian Hospital, after serving from 2000–2011 as president and chief executive officer of the hospital and the NewYork–Presbyterian Healthcare System. Under his leadership, NewYork–Presbyterian Hospital escalated to one of the highest ranked hospitals and comprehensive health care institutions in the United States.

Dr. Pardes has chaired the departments of psychiatry at Downstate Medical Center, the University of Colorado and Columbia University. He served from 1989–2000 as the dean of the faculty of medicine at Columbia University College of Physicians and Surgeons and vice president for health sciences. A noted psychiatrist, he served as director of the National Institute of Mental Health and the United States assistant surgeon general during the Carter and Reagan Administrations, and was president of the American Psychiatric Association. He also served on commissions related to health policy appointed by Presidents George W. Bush and Bill Clinton.

He is a member of the National Academy of Medicine (formerly Institute of Medicine) and of the American Academy of Arts and Sciences. His honors include the United States Army Commendation Medal, the Sarnat International Prize for leadership in the field of mental health, and the first Pardes Humanitarian Award in mental health sponsored in part by leaders of the Brain & Behavior Research Foundation.

Barry S. Collier, MD, and Bobbi Collier, PhD, are being honored for their longtime support of the Academy Library and its role in bridging medicine, history and the arts through research, public programming and education.

Barry S. Collier is clinical professor of medicine at the Icahn School of Medicine at Mount Sinai, as well as the David Rockefeller Professor of Medicine; head of the Allen and Frances Adler Laboratory of Blood and Vascular Biology; physician-in-chief of The Rockefeller University Hospital; and vice president for medical affairs at The Rockefeller University. He also serves as the founding director of the Rockefeller University Center for Clinical and Translational Science and the principal investigator of the University's Clinical and Translational Science Award [CTSA].

Bobbi Collier is an art historian, independent curator, and art educator. 2017 FELLOWS HIGHLIGHTS



The Fellows Office hosted its annual **Open House** event on January 30, welcoming more than 50 new Fellows and Members from the class of 2016 and their guests to network, meet the Academy's staff, Board members and Fellow Ambassadors, and tour the Library's Drs. Barry and Bobbi Collier Rare Book Reading Room.

The **Health Informatics Workgroup**, established in 2016, hosted its first event, a panel discussion on **"Population Health Information Technology (PHIT): From the Bedside to the Community,"** at the Academy on May 1 in partnership with the New York State Chapter of the Health Information Management Systems Society–New York Chapter (HIMSS–NY). The event drew close to 150 attendees.



The interdisciplinary **Section on Healthy Aging** was established this year and held its first meeting in June. The section seeks to improve the health, well-being, and engagement of older people in cities through inter-professional communication and networks; community and public advocacy; leadership development; and education, research, and policy involvement. Section Chair Dr. Rosanne Leipzig co-directed a symposium on **"Transforming Care for Older Adults,"** held at the Academy on September 11 in partnership with Healthfirst.

The Academy **Fellow Ambassadors program**, now in its third year, connects Fellows' expertise with the media through local and national media Op-Eds, blogs, and commenting on breaking health news. The 2017–18 class of Ambassadors (pictured here with Dr. Max Gomez of CBS News) was selected through a competitive application process to share their expertise in areas including infectious disease, immigrant health, child and adolescent mental health, elder trauma and health, managed care, and health care access and costs.





The Academy supported the next generation of researchers through four **summer grant and fellowship programs** for medical, dental and public health students: the Glorney–Raisbeck Medical Student Grants in Cardiovascular Research, the Margaret E. Mahoney Fellowships, the David E. Rogers Student Fellowship Award, and the Ferdinand C. Valentine Medical Student Research Grants in Urology. Each student conducted a summer research project under the direction of an established senior investigator at a top institution.



Academy Fellow Randi Epstein, MD, MPH, gave the first talk in the Academy's joint series with the Museum of the City of New York, "Who Controls Women's Health? A Century of Struggle." Dr. Epstein's talk, **"Get Me Out: Childbirth in Early 20th Century NYC,"** drew more than 350 attendees to the Academy's Hosack Hall on August 22.

The Fellows Office and the Academy Library collaborated on the 2017 Nahum J. Winer Lecture by Dr. Paul Kligfield, MD, entitled **"Sudden Death in Rome, 1705: Giovanni Lancisi, Pope Clement XI, and the Tale of a Book,"** and a talk by Patricia D'Antonio, PhD, RN, FAAN, on **"Nursing with a Message: Public Health Demonstration Projects in New York City."**

The Academy renewed its partnership with the **Royal Society of Medicine** to provide the opportunity for our Fellows and Members to join the RSM as Overseas Fellows at a discounted rate.
